The Guild welcomed Jan Grady to our August 26 Membership Meeting where she talked about her supplies and process in creating watercolors.

She was a computer programmer/project manager at Hewlett-Packard and began creating art just prior to retirement in 1998. Jan created portraits in pastel until she was forced to quit due to the dust affecting her lungs.


## Her supplies consist of:

- an airtight palette
- mainly transparent watercolor and she glazes frequently
- a tool for referencing value studies by artist Judy Morris
- white porcelain dishes or butcher trays
- Fabriano Artistico Soft Press Bright White Watercolor paper in 300 lb. weight
- Jan paints with round brushes using a combination of Daniel Smith and Winsor & Newton paints

## Jan's Process and Suggestions

- Doesn't pre-soak paper as it removes the sizing
- She paints at a slight angle using a wedge to prop her work up as it's easier on the neck
- Uses an old towel under her work which deters the paper from blossoming as it dries
- Consistently walks away from her work in progress to acquire a better perspective
- Uses a tiny crochet hook to apply masking fluid
- Uses a projector to transfer images on paper
- Uses a complement color to tone down where needed
- Likes starting with lights and punching in with the darkest darks
- Creates her own matts and frames reducing the cost in purchasing her paintings
- Paints from her photos that have been manipulated in Photoshop
