# Start now in creating your ... Artists Trading Cards (ATCs)

Artists Trading Cards are original works of art that are created on 2.5" x 3.5" pieces of material the artist chooses (e.g., canvas, paper, board, ...) in any medium chosen. It would be great if everyone participated to help make this a fun part of the meeting's festivities.

Please create no more than two (2) ATCs and bring them to the meeting. The cards will be put on display prior to the time we start trading and then transferred to their own envelopes for trading. Those who created ATCs are eligible to exchange them until there are none left to exchange.

## Jenna Hobbs Interpreting Hollyhocks in Gouache

We welcomed local artist and instructor Jenna Hobbs on October 26 as our demonstrator. Jenna is a talented artist who works in a variety of mediums. She has most recently begun incorporating geometric shapes into her landscapes to show how humans have organized natural landscapes using geometric shapes and forms.

**Gouache** (pronounced Gwash) is a water-based paint that is similar to watercolor and acrylic paint; it's opaque and dries to a flat, matte finish.

Jenna came with a prepared sketch on toned Arches 140# watercolor paper, and a preferred color palette of Ultramarine, Cadmium Red, Lemon Yellow,

White, Burnt Umber, Burnt Sienna, Magenta, Prussian Blue and premixes of three shades of greens and grays. In *Figure 1* – She painted the sky (Prussian Blue+White), background trees (olive green mixture+white), and moved forward to apply Hollyhock shadows (Umber+Magenta) and a midtone of Magenta+White for the

Hollyhock flowers' base color.

Moving around her canvas, she mixed Lemon Yellow+Ultramarine+White in a variety of shades for the foreground greens; switched to a No. 4 Flat brush for the Hollyhock buds (*Figure 2*). Jenna typically works with three tones: Shadow, Midtone, Highlight. She used Magenta+White for hollyhock highlights, and reserves White for the lightest highlights.

- Holbein Gouache Set of 12 colors: \$49 (Jenna's paint of choice)
- 18 Wells, Palette with Silicone Lid (to keep paints hydrated): \$13

**Substrates**: Arches Watercolor Paper, Illustration Board, and Canson Gray-toned Paper.

- No framing is necessary but your art must be dry to handle by the specified deadline.
- If creations are made using dry media or water media on paper, the art should be under a matt for protection and, if available, a plastic sleeve.
- Artwork is presented to membership three (3) months from the date announced.
- Artists will share their finished art to membership; how they approached the project, medium used, etc.
- The use of copyrighted photos from any source is prohibited.
- Art created in workshops or online courses is prohibited.

Competitions Briefly Explained

#### **Artist of the Month (AOM)**

New Active members must attend one meeting before being eligible to compete. During the calendar year, ongoing Active members must attend at least one of three consecutive meetings prior to a competition.

#### **Blue Ribbon Gallery (BRG)**

Active members who have won a blue ribbon in the AOM competition (January–December) and who have attended at least one of three consecutive meetings prior to this competition are eligible to compete in the BRG for the remainder of the year. Previously awarded art from any AOM competition is not permitted.

#### **Artist of the Year (AOY)**

The AOY is held at the January Membership Meeting. Active members who have won a blue ribbon in the BRG, must attend at least one of three consecutive meetings prior to this competition for eligibility to compete.

Blue Ribbon Gallery ribbon recipients may enter a new or a previously awarded piece of art for this competition. First, second and third place ribbons are awarded at the January Membership Meeting.



## "Oh, my goodness! What was I thinking?"

Mistakes happen. The oil painting you had originally envisioned has morphed into, well, not what you had expected. There's help, so don't throw away that canvas!

If you're an oil painter, you can take that cured painting and apply a thin layer of Gamblin® Oil Ground Gesso and, voila!, you now have a new blank canvas! Here's how it works ...

First, a disclaimer that this is <u>not</u> a commercial for Gamblin Oil Ground Gesso. I found out about this product searching the internet and gave it a try as I had oil paintings that didn't make my expectations, and I didn't want to trash the canvases. There are other manufacturers of oil grounds: Winsor & Newton

and Williamsburg, and I invite you to research them.

Oil Ground may be used to cover a canvas previously painted in oil; an economical way to reuse your canvases or panels when the painting doesn't turn out the

way you had hoped.

Oil Ground may also be applied directory over an acrylic primed canvas or panel to reduce the oil's absorbency; improving color saturation of your oil paints.

Not a fan of a "blank, white canvas?" Oil colors may be mixed into the Oil Ground to create a tinted ground.

To make the most of your tools and time, plan on priming more than one canvas or panel in the same session.

If your painting has been sitting around for some months (or years) gathering dust, wipe it down with a wet lint-proof cloth and let dry before applying the Oil Ground.

### **How to Use Gamblin Oil Ground**

Due to its higher pigment load, Gamblin Oil Ground is thicker than acrylic gesso, and requires less coats and a different application technique.

Oil Ground should be applied in 1-2 thin applications with a palette knife or trowel right out

of the can, but may also be thinned with odorless mineral spirits.

After applying the oil ground on my canvas, I immediately followed up with a 4-inch .25" short-nap roller (think Home Depot for an economical 6-pack) to evenly cover the canvas. With one thin coat, you may apply your oil paints in less than five days.

### Try it – you might like it!

I have used this product on many older oil paintings with much success. Gamblin Oil Ground provides the perfect platform for oil paints.


